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Get To Know Your Teacher





However, if he wants his mission to succeed, then he needs to confront his prior mistakes and work side by side with Rooster, played by Miles Teller. Additionally, Jennifer Conelly, Val Kilmer, Jon Hamm, Monica Barbaro, Glen Powell, Lewis Pullman, and Ed Harris star in supporting roles. Instead of diversity casting, all of these actors are talented and depicted their personalities brilliantly.

Because the VFX artists and the cinematographers spent a lot of effort in creating this movie, watching this will undoubtedly be one of the most exhilarating experiences you will ever have. Every action scene, from start to finish, will put you at the edge of your seat. Thanks to the work of the aerobatic squadron Blue Angels, all of the shots use appropriate angles and capture the intense emotions it intends to portray. Moreover, the IMAX cameras installed in the cockpits ensure that the footage is as highresolution as possible. Although the nose and mouth of the pilots are covered by oxygen masks, the positions of the cameras allow the audience to rely on their upper facial expressions to create an atmosphere of tension. Apart from the stunning camerawork, the filmmakers made the right decision to rely on practical effects instead of CGI, which adds a sense of realism.

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The film's plot is undoubtedly remarkable. Even though the film didn't have a tangible antagonist, the conflicts the characters have carry weight to them and are not mere plot conveniences. In addition, the writers handled the character arcs of both new and old characters in a satisfying and logical manner. Unlike most contemporary sequels, "Top Gun Maverick" does not disrespect the legacy of the previous film and instead keeps the characters consistent with prior portrayals. For example, Maverick remains hot-headed and persistent when faced with various obstacles and conflicts throughout the movie. The newly introduced pilots, who were picked based on aptitude instead of diversity, were all distinctive and likable. In contrast to most movies that attempt to pander to a feminist audience via underdeveloped female characters, the newly introduced female pilot is likable, sympathetic, and a 3-dimensional character.





Last but not least, the film is definitely a treat for fans of the original movie. Various call-backs to the original movie are present. From the memorable theme songs to the return of fan-favorite characters, the film tries to prioritize the fans first and foremost. Although some may argue that the fan-service feels like a cheap cash grab, the film sets these moments up initially and delivers a satisfying pay-off. 
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
